We were twenty-four for dinner and could have squeezed in a few more with no trouble. From all accounts the salmon was marvellous, the chicken great and the prawns tasty but rather sparse.

After dinner, Carsten hosted a raffle. We were all flush with tickets thanks to Yvonne Daczko's super salesmanship (or was that 'arm twisting'?). Every boat won a prize - with the exception of our Commodore's boat. Norm says that keeps his record of not winning anything intact! Just as we were preparing to leave for dinner earlier that evening, the rain started again. Before long the skies really opened-up. Vancouver airport, just 20 miles across the Straits, recorded $91 \text{mm} \ (>3^1/_2 \text{in})$, a one-day record and nearly twice the normal monthly rainfall for September. Based on Don's precision rainmeter (an upright bucket in the dinghy), Silva Bay had at least 75 mm of rain. We certainly didn't have to worry about footprints on deck!

But, by dawn, the skies were once again clear and another beautiful fall day was in the making. Several boats left for home early. Those of us who stayed on had an informative and enjoyable tour of the Silva Bay Boatbuilding School, which draws its students from all over the world. This was followed by lunch at the pub before heading off.

It was a great weekend. We hope more boats will join us next year.




It's a Small World

CS West Conducts Member Survey

In May, your executive decided to conduct a member survey to see what we were doing right and what we could do better.

The survey was to be a vehicle to get ideas from the membership. So we composed a simple questionnaire that we hoped would provoke thought. It was distributed by e-mail in August. We closed off responses on 15 Sept so we could compile the results for our meetings at Silva Bay on 19 Sept. Sixteen boats were represented in the responses, which is about 20% of the membership.

The quality of responses was very good, providing useful feedback. We're happy to report that those who responded are generally happy with the current functioning of CS West. Nonetheless, we received a number of good suggestions for improvement.

Most of you like the format of the major rendezvous, but you asked us to look into alternative locations. In order to hold our place with the two current locations, we need to reserve a full year in advance. So, for 2005 we will probably stay with Port Browning and Silva Bay since we've already reserved. But, we are checking out several potential new locations: Poets' Cove, Ganges, Telegraph Harbour and Snug Cove. And, in response to one specific suggestion, we will try a club breakfast, prepared by the CS West executive, at Port Browning on the Sunday morning.

In spite of poor attendance at mini-rendezvous in 2004, we will continue to hold them in 2005. But, we'll try a couple of new locations and, in response to suggestions from several of you, we plan to add a sail racing event to at least one mini-rendezvous.

While several of you suggested we look into other locations for our fall and winter meetings, we think, for logistical reasons, we'd be hard pressed to improve on SNSYC and RVYC. SNSYC, being handy to the ferry terminals, allows our mainland members to attend and return home the same day. Holding the winter meeting

at RVYC takes advantage of the large number of non-Vancouver members that are usually in the city for the boat show. We did briefly consider a couple of other locations, but each presented significant challenges that we didn't think would be acceptable. Thus, for the time-being, we'll be sticking with Sidney and Vancouver as our meeting locations. They seem to offer the optimum arrangements for accessibility to most of our members. Many good topics and speakers for future meetings were suggested.

Regarding communications, you all seem very happy with the newsletter – well done Don. There were several good suggestions regarding the website. In the near future, we will add a schedule of CS West events to the web site. As well, we will also add a list of the modifications you have made to your boats (as reported in your responses to the survey) and cross-reference those modifications to boat names. For privacy reasons, we don't think we should name people.

Likewise, you seem to be happy with the membership information – well done Stephanie.

As for member discounts, Reliance Insurance Agencies in Vancouver has set up a fleet policy for CS owners which has resulted in significant savings for those of us who have signed-on. In addition, we will seek discounts for you at chandleries in Vancouver and Sidney. Going beyond those two areas gets difficult due to the dispersed locations of our members .

Carsten's technical seminars are highly regarded and, hence, will continue at future rendezvous. Many good new topics were suggested. But, let's give Carsten some help. If you would be prepared to lead a seminar, please let us know.

Overall, your executive is very pleased to see that CS West is so well appreciated, both for its camaraderie and as a medium for the exchange of boat information.

The Hors-d'Oeuvres Corner - Jane's Brandy-Nut Brie

In keeping with the tradition established in the last issue of CS West, here is the recipe for Jane Swanson's Brandy-Nut Brie, the hit of the Silva Bay happy hour. Jane says the recipe was taken from "Grand Slam" and that more such recipes can be obtained from the "Best of Bridge". (I guess we know how she passes her time in the winter!)

1/4 cup brown sugar

1/4 cup pecans or cashews-chopped

I tbsp brandy

I 4 inch round brie

crackers

Oven method: Stir together sugar, nuts and brandy. Bake cheese at 500 degrees for 4-5 min. Mound sugar mixture on cheese and bake 2-3 min. more - until sugar is melted.

Microwave method: Cook sugar, nuts and brandy on high for I min or until sugar is melted. Place sugar mixture on cheese and microwave on medium for approximately 2 min.

We tend to use a larger cheese for the CS gatherings and alter the other quantities as the mood strikes us!!!

Do You Have a Leaking or Cloudy Hatch Cover?

If so, you may find the following helpful.

The cover of the hatch over *Gadgets* main salon recently developed a leak. On-the-dock advice at the Silva Bay rendezvous was that I should take the unit to an automotive glass shop. So, I visited several auto-glass shops in Victoria. The first one that inspired any confidence was Standard Auto Glass on Government Street.

While they had never resealed a hatch cover before, the Manager, Ken Smith has an apparently genuine interest in boats and was very helpful. (Someone else was there at the time looking for new framing-channel for the ports on his boat.) Ken removed the old plexiglass from my hatch cover, not without difficulty but without a scratch. It turns out that, when I had the plexiglass replaced five years ago, it had been epoxied into the

frame. Thus, the old "slice the sealant and push the glass out with your foot" trick wouldn't have worked for me. The leak was due to the epoxy corroding and, in one corner, separating from, the aluminum frame.

After grinding the remaining epoxy off the frame and cleaning up the old plexiglass as best possible, new, marine-grade silicone sealant was applied. The next morning, my hatch cover was as good as new.

The price? Not marine-grade at all.

If you have a similar problem or simply wish to replace cloudy plexiglass, I suggest you visit Ken Smith at Standard Auto Glass. No fuss, no mess!
