Weather Forecasting Course

CS West is providing a two-day weather forecasting course for up to twenty participants, to be held Saturday 3 Nov and Sunday 4 Nov 2007 at the Sidney North Saanich Yacht Club (SNSYC). This is the same weekend as our CS West Fall meeting at the SNSYC. The objective of the course will be to allow participants to predict the weather on the southwest coast of BC.

The cost of the two-day course is \$75 per person or \$100 per couple. To this add \$25 per person to cover the costs of lunches and refreshments for the two days. We will start on Saturday 3 Nov at 1100 (when the Vancouver 0900 ferry arrives) and will end at 1630, as our CS West Fall meeting will start at 1700. On Sunday 4 Nov the course will run from 0900 to 1600, allowing people to catch the 1700 ferry back to the mainland.

A CS Summer—highlights and lowlights

Polaris spent six weeks cruising this summer from Sidney to the Broughton's. Our trip was made most enjoyable by the number of CS West friends that we encountered during our trip. This cameraderie more than made up for all the inclement weather.

We started with the CS mini rendezvous on July 6th at Clam Bay. John and Sylvia Taylor of Deckadance with their friend Anne joined us for Happy Hour. Then the new owners of Falcon, Leo Routledge and Chris Yeomans, arrived, and were welcomed to the group.

Continuing up to Nanaimo, we spent a night at Newcastle Island where we found Amourena at anchor and socialized with Terry and Catherine Mooney. There was an unknown CS 36T anchored there called Interlude II with nobody aboard. We later heard that she has returned from offshore and is for sale. With gale force winds predicted, we moved to the Nanaimo Yacht Club dock for two days where we were visited by Bob and Susan Cook of My Windsong. They are heading offshore this year. We checked the Harbour Chandlery with Carl Swanson of Carriad, who made sure we received our discounts. Keith and Polly Tracey of Take Five were spotted in the marina with visitors from England.

Next stop was Schooner Cove where we found ourselves moored next to Whistler I and FarFetch. The Duffley's were in the East celebrating a big birthday for Dick. We chatted briefly with John Amy who was working on FarFetch and then joined Barb and Dieter Giese of Blue Lagoon for dinner. Summer happened while we were in Schooner Cove. The thermometer hit thirty six degrees celsius (for our American friends that's in the 90's). We used the pool!

After visiting friends in Comox, we headed up to Rebecca Spit, meeting Amourena again, then on to the Octopus Islands, Thurston Bay, Blind Channel, Port Harvey, Lagoon Cove, Potts Lagoon, Port McNeil, Crease Island, Matilpi Bay, Forward Harbour, Cordero Islands, Shoal Bay, and Oleo's at Frederick Arm. During this section of the trip, we frequently ended up in the same places as a group cruising from the Schooner Cove Yacht Club and got quite friendly with some of them. We accused each other of stalking. While in Port McNeil awaiting parts to rebuild the raw water pump, we took the opportunity to visit Alert Bay and Sointula by ferry. A highlight of this part of the trip was catching a twenty-five pound chinook salmon at the intersection of Cordero and Nodales channels. Since we had time to spare, Carsten rooted out our barely used downrigger and we joined the parade of boats trolling along the shore. We were the only sailboat. Lo and behold, we finally got a strike. Netting a struggling and heavy fish over the side of a sailboat

is quite a feat. This catch allowed us to later feed the masses in Pendrell Sound.

Having had our fill of rain, we headed south to Desolation Sound – not much drier, but warmer. Arriving at Squirrel Cove for the August 4th mini rendezvous, Polaris rafted with Kewao, Wind Dancer, and Optical Illusion. Tack-tic, Sante (formerly Gamma), and Amourena were also anchored in Squirrel Cove. The guys spent a lot of time measuring their dip sticks and discussing whether or not a hole in the end was advantageous (sounded rather kinky to us wives). Terry of Amourena returned to his boat and drilled a hole in his, apparently solving a transmission fluid problem. A group of us hiked from Squirrel Cove to Von Donop Inlet the next day. We got somewhat muddy and Carsten got stung but otherwise had a good time.

This mini rendezvous continued on for nearly two weeks, with a varying cast of characters, from Squirrel Cove to Nanaimo. Is this the longest rendezous ever?! Polaris, Kewao, and Wind Dancer headed off to Pendrell Sound for a couple of days. On the way up the Sound we met Dennis Myronuk and Antoinette Dumalo of Monaxia. They hailed us from their dinghy, tendered their regrets for missing the mini, and displayed their catch of a big red snapper. Bill and Janet Jackson (Optical Illusion) also rafted with us for a night in Pendrell. Tom Shenton and Don Spinar kept us supplied with prawns for happy hour. Barry and Dale Rolston of first morning also stopped and tied up to us briefly before the raft broke up with some of us heading for Refuge Cove. Minnedosa and Whistler I had just arrived in Tenedos Bay with some Schooner Cove boats but we never saw them.

After a night in Refuge Cove, Polaris headed over to Galley Bay to meet Phil and June Cocking of Trelawney I. As we motored over, I peacefully reading a book, there was an almighty crash and we stopped dead. We had hit a rock! Luckily nobody was hurt and there seemed to be no water coming in. We continued on to Galley Bay, rafted with Trelawney I, and assessed the damage. The engine was working alright but there were signs of structural damage. Carsten was mortified. Other people hit rocks - not us! He has taught Power Squadron, been around Vancouver Island, successfully navigated Beware Passage in the Broughton's, and never hit a rock. Thank goodness that we have such strong boats and that I was not at the helm!

We anchored in Grace Harbour with Trelawney I and Mary Ellen and Don Spinar of Wind Dancer. Since we did not have the number of the insurance company with us, we unsuccessfully attempted to contact Optical Illusion who have the same company and were actually buddy boating

with their agent.

During our two days in Grace Harbour, we headed for the Laughing Oyster restaurant for lunch on Trelawney I. Since there was no space at the dock, we prepared to anchor. At this point Phil's anchor windlass gave up the ghost. As he could not tell how much chain he had out, Phil was not happy leaving the boat and we headed back to Grace Harbour minus lunch. He rafted to Wind Dancer and set his second anchor.

Time to head home before something else happened. Wind Dancer and Kewao accompanied Polaris to Powell River from where we notified our insurance agent of the accident. CS Cape was stopping in Westview on their way up to Desolation. Next stop was Secret Cove where we had lunch with Keith and Polly Tracey of Take Five and admired their new dodger. Next morning Polaris and Wind Dancer motored across to Nanaimo (fortunately Whisky Gulf wasn't active). We did not want to risk putting any extra strain on the hull by sailing. First morning radioed us with a generous offer of a tow to Sidney if required. There

are no secrets over the VHF!

We docked in Nanaimo Harbour and took the ferry with the Spinars to the Dinghy Dock for dinner. Barry Rolston (first morning) and his friend joined us there. Later on in the evening, Janet and Bill Jackson (Optical Illusion) visited Polaris to commiserate and offer advice. They had also heard of our disaster. We left at dawn the next morning to catch slack at Dodd's Narrows. Spotted Serendipitous leaving at the same time. Went through Dodd's Narrows with Freyja, a Tredwell 43, owned by Feather Mills and Simon Brissenden. They are planning to go offshore and have Captivator up for sale in Sidney.

Polaris arrived home safely and is now (at time of writing) awaiting a visit from the marine insurance surveyor. We appreciate all the help and support we got from fellow CS owners after we hit the rock. It seems that practically everyone has a rock story to tell.

This is a great group to belong to!
